To rise to the challenge.


To answer the call.

Divine Mercy Sunday

As I write this article, I sit by the fireplace having just celebrated Christmas Day with my family. It is cold and dark in Saratoga Springs. I know that when you read this, we will all be in the midst of Lent, awaiting the Triduum and then the triumph of Easter. The Sunday following Easter is **Divine Mercy Sunday** and that, my sisters, is my topic and thoughts for you in this column.

To Saint Faustina Our Lord said: My daughter, tell the whole world about My inconceivable mercy. I desire that the Feast of Mercy be a refuge and shelter for all souls, and especially for poor sinners. On that day the very depths of My tender mercy are open. I pour out a whole ocean of graces upon those souls who approach the fount of My mercy. The soul that will go to Confession and receive Holy Communion shall obtain complete forgiveness of sins and punishment. On that day all the divine floodgates through which grace flow are opened. Let no soul fear to draw near to Me, even though its sins be as scarlet. My mercy is so great that no mind, be it of man or of angel, will be able to fathom it throughout all eternity. Everything that exists has come forth from the very depths of My most tender mercy. Every soul in its relation to Me will contemplate My love and mercy throughout eternity. The Feast of Mercy emerged from My very depths of

tenderness. It is My desire that it be solemnly celebrated on the First Sunday after Easter. Mankind will not have peace until it turns to the Fount of My Mercy. (Diary, 699).

We are all in need of God's tender mercy. Can you even imagine what a wonderful feast this is and what Jesus is offering us on Divine Mercy Sunday? Read these words again: The soul that will go to confession and receive Holy Communion shall obtain complete forgiveness of sins and punishment.

Here is my desire and my prayer for each of us. Receive the sacrament of Reconciliation before Easter Sunday, and receive Communion on Divine Mercy Sunday. But there is more that our Lord asks of us. As we receive mercy, we must show mercy to others...pay it forward so to speak. Jesus reminds us, Yes, but there must also be acts of mercy. ...I demand from you deeds of mercy which are to arise out of love for Me. You are to show mercy to your neighbors always and everywhere. You must not shrink from this or try to excuse or absolve yourself from it. (Diary, 742)

Jesus said, whomever approaches the Fountain of Life on this day will be granted complete forgiveness of sins and punishment. (Diary, 300). Share this with your friends, implore your family, ask your parish priest for additional confession



times if possible, let those individuals who have been away from the church know that mercy and forgiveness is theirs if they desire it. Invite everyone you encounter during your daily life to Reconciliation and Mass on Divine Mercy Sunday by explaining the promise of Jesus for complete forgiveness of sins and punishment. Can you imagine how many souls you will save?

Can you imagine the joy in Heaven over the lost who will be found? Share this with your Catholic Daughter sisters at the next meeting before Divine Mercy Sunday. At your May meeting, talk about the graces and joy you received and please share your experiences with me. May God bless you always and in all ways.

Sadly, only 18 courts chose to participate in our first attempt at this project to support the military, but those courts wrote and/or collected 2,956 thank you cards for our troops!

After we had sent our donation to the NASH-FM Ty Bentli Show 100,000 Thank Yous Project, Project Chairman Margaret Frisch received about 70 additional cards from addresses in Commack and Westbury. She forwarded those to the project.

I hope that next year every court in our state participates in this worthwhile and easy project. If we did nothing other than had each member in our state write one card, we would have collected over 60,000 notes of thanks for our troops.

Holiday Collection for VA Medical Center & Military



Court #1264 Catherine Esther, Canajoharie, has spearheaded a community-wide drive to collect needed items for wounded military and veterans for many years. The collection is taken by a local Veteran (who works at the VA Hospital) to the Chief of Voluntary Services at the Stratton Veteran's Administration Medical Center in Albany. The collection is then distributed to wounded and veterans at the nursing home facility there at Christmastime. By the weekend of Thanksgiving, collection boxes were in place in the lobbies of an area bank, a mini-shopping mall and in the vestibules of Our Lady of Hope Parish Church in Fort Plain. The residents of a local adult home also participated in donating items to the collection. The drive was publicized in the area newspapers and church bulletins. Flyers with a list of needed items were placed in our church vestibules, stores and various other public places. The flyers also asked for monetary donations to purchase care packages to be sent to deployed military.

After the deadline, the collection boxes were picked up and taken to the Regent's home where the collected items were packed in mid December, then picked up and delivered. Three members of our court gathered at the Regent's home and packed the collection into 12 boxes for pick-up by the veteran transporting the collection to the hospital. The monetary donations were substantial and the Regent was able to purchase 20 Christmas care packages (valued at \$22.00 each) from the Soldiers' Angels website. These care packages were shipped to deployed soldiers by the Soldiers' Angels Organization. The court also sent a donation to the VA Hospital in Albany for their Holiday Fund.
